FSIPP 2011 Educational Objectives

At the end of the session, participants should be better able to:

1. Update on Red Wine and Health – define healthy wine drinking and list the health benefits related to moderate consumption; summarize wine polyphenol chemistry and the evidence for these compounds in prevention and treatment of degenerative diseases; discuss the role of alcohol in healthy drinking and why wine is superior to grape juice in terms of health benefits; review the potential for wine polyphenols such as resveratrol as the basis for advanced anti-aging pharmaceuticals.
2. Clinical Aspects of Risk Management in Opioid Therapy – discuss the prevalence of prescription opioid abuse and its impact on chronic pain management; assess and differentially diagnose aberrant drug-taking behaviors; apply a risk management package to avoid drug abuse and diversion in the use of opioids for chronic pain.
3. The Florida Statutes, DOH Regulations, and BOM/BOOM Rules Regarding Pain Clinics – review the evolution of the Statutes, Regulations, and Rules; comply with the requirements of the Statutes, Regulations, and Rules.
4. Strategies for Defense of “Pill Mill” Cases - prevent being cited as a “pill mill,” i.e., maintain record-keeping (compliance, completeness, retention, duplication), screen employees and patients (background investigation, social networking, drug testing), behave appropriately for subpoenas, grand juries, search warrants, being charged, arrested.
5. The Neuro-Musculoskeletal Physical Exam with Pearls – frame the importance of physical examination in the care of the pain patient; review the most common causes of low back pain and neck pain; list factors often minimized in common textbooks; create a more healing and trusting relationship with the patient; explain the mechanics and examination of the human gait; identify and explain common diagnostic dilemmas in the physical examination; discuss spinal and peripheral nerve dermatomes and myotomes.
6. The Problem and Future in Pain Medicine – identify measurement-based care (MBC) as one of the foundations of Pain Medicine; track outcomes to develop evidence-based treatment algorithms; employ MBC as a clinical tool to enhance value to the patient and the healthcare system.
7. Infection Control in Interventional Pain Management – list risk factors for infection in pain management procedures (device, room and equipment, and procedure itself); follow CDC pre-operative/perioperative/post-operative recommendations for minimizing infection; apply antibiotic

timing requirements; discuss case studies from the Mayo Clinic regarding infection control associated with implantable pain therapy devices.

8. Clinical Research Breakthroughs and Updates – review the current status of four ongoing clinical research studies: nonparesthesia spinal cord stimulation, minimally invasive lumbar decompression vs epidural steroid injection for spinal stenosis, cooled radiofrequency for SIJ pain; spinal cord stimulation for neuropathic pain, and vertebral augmentation for spine fractures; discuss study complications, outcomes, and future directions.
9. Interventional Procedures in the Thoracolumbar Spine and the Risk of Paralysis – list procedures which put the blood supply to the thoracolumbar spinal cord at risk; describe the anatomy of the thoracolumbar blood supply including the arteria radicularis magnus (ARM) and anterior radicular arteries; avoid the ARM while performing these procedures.
10. The Evolution of Epidural Lysis of Adhesions – outline the evolution of lysis of adhesions from the work of the early pioneers to today’s latest publications; discuss warnings for hazards and safety concerns; perform the procedure using the preferred technique, introducing a navigable catheter into the epidural space.
11. Spinal Cord Stimulation vs Reoperation – compare and contrast the results of SCS vs reoperation (lumbosacral surgery for chronic, intractable pain) in a randomized, controlled trial by the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.
12. Intradiscal Fibrin Sealant for the Treatment of Chronic Low Back Pain Caused by Lumbar Internal Disc Disruption – discuss and describe this ongoing Phase III clinical research study about an investigational biologic approach, from pilot study design, inclusion/exclusion criteria through methods, outcome measures, and adverse events, to safety and efficacy outcomes; possibly add intradiscal fibrin sealant to one’s treatment regimen when conservative, interventional, and surgical approaches have not helped the symptomatic patient, or in lieu of some of these approaches.
13. Evidence Based Guidelines for Pain Management Procedures – compare and contrast various guidelines for interventional pain management treatments (including opioid prescribing and interventional procedures) including the new Official Disability Guidelines, the new Medicare and Blue Cross Blue Shield treatment guidelines, American College of Occupational and Environmental Medicine guidelines, and American Society of Interventional Pain Physicians guidelines; list documentation required to get authorizations and document medical necessity in order to obtain treatment; discuss peer reviewed literature.
